

Abra had 24-hour care to assist in all her needs. She leaned on staff for the first few weeks as she struggled with pain and needed support to complete daily physical therapy. But once Abra felt better and became stronger, she became a part of the home: she enjoyed being around others for TV, sharing meals, cooking, playing board games, and sharing laughter. Oh, how Abra loves to laugh, tease, and have a good time. Those who live at there, along with the staff, were blessed.

4th was home for a few months for Abra. It was exactly what she needed!

Thank you to the team at 4th for making this a successful rehabilitation journey. Abra is back at her apartment and back at work.



A Reflection: Joe Zent's Spirit Living On

The day after Thanksgiving, the Christmas décor went up to the 1st floor of 4th Avenue. I was delighted that staff were eager to begin.

When I returned, a day or two later, everyone's trees were put up in their bedrooms, the large Christmas tree had ornaments and lights, the common area was decorated with holiday wall hangings and fixtures, and then I saw: The POLE.

This is a little story, filled with the magical spirit of Joe Zent (who passed away August 9, 2021). He LOVED Christmas: singing, presents, Santa, and wishing everyone a 'Merry Christmas'.

The Pole. You see, there are 2 poles in the hallway of the home (for the structure of the building), but only ONE was decorated with ribbon, only ONE had ornaments on it, only ONE had the figure of a Santa at the base of the pole, sitting on the floor. And the pole was NOT covered with ribbon to the bottom, to meet the floor. The pole was not covered to hide the scraped paint that is missing on it.

This pole has always been referred to as 'Joe's Pole' because he always took that corner too sharp while using his wheelchair; thus the paint was rubbed off from the base of it.

-The pole was repainted after remodeling from a fire.

-And it was repainted, again, several weeks later because Joe had already left his mark.
-After the 2nd painting, we left it as it was: it was 'Joe's Pole'.



When Joe passed away, I touch up painted his bedroom. I knew of the pole, but I couldn't paint it. I wanted, I needed, to see that pole as it was: with no paint on the bottom; remembering Joe, pedaling his feet in the wheelchair as he came and went from his bedroom to the larger living area. I needed to glance at that pole each time I walked the hall.

This is magical, but it is even more so because it was not a veteran staff who knew of 'Joe's Pole'. It was a traveling CNA who decorated that pole, who was not working at 4th when Joe lived there.

Why was only one pole decorated? Why did the ribbon not go to the base of the pole to cover the paint that was missing? And why put Santa by the pole? Why? Why?

So many of us have been touched. So many of us are filled with Joe's presence. Joe loved Christmas. Joe loved Santa.

The Spirit of Christmas lives on . . . Merry Christmas, Joe!!! We love you!!!

I've been so fortunate in my life to know at an early age what I wanted for my future. I was the kind of kid who didn't join in with others when they made fun of those who were different. I was the young lifeguard parents requested to teach their child with down syndrome or other differences how to swim. While still in college I was hired to start the 2nd Story Social Club in Minot to provide a gathering spot where people with varying abilities could get together on their terms. When my husband, Steve, and I lived in the Flathead Lake area in



Montana, I worked for the Salish Kootenai Tribe supporting people in our recycling, hydroponic greenhouse, and frame shop departments. When a friend told me about a group of Bowman people (Arc, Little Missouri, Inc.) who were looking for someone to start an adult day program, we jumped at the chance to return to North Dakota. And they hired me!! © That was January 18, 1982. Oof, am I really that old...ha. But aren't I so glad to have lived here all these years.

In 1984, the two Arc's in Dickinson and Bowman combined forces to start a new agency (ABLE, Inc.) that would also develop a day/residential program in Hettinger. We became official October 1, 1984 and have never looked back. My job has been to oversee all of our services in Bowman and Hettinger as Director of Satellite Services. All of you will have the continuing benefit of our amazing team doing what they do best... making daily life for people even better.

This past summer Steve sold his Waterhole Bar in Rhame after almost 39 years of ownership. Quite a run we've both had. Mid-February (also my retirement date) we'll head to Arizona to watch his beloved Dodgers spring train and then back to Mayo where he's been doctoring for Primary Myelofibrosis. Life can be scary and at the same time ever so good. I wish all of you the best of the best and thank you for sticking with me all these years. -Carolynne
